orchards, large and small, as a result of **Manzana's** announcement that they will be shuttering their processing plant and moving to Washington State in 2025. We hope you will engage in one way or another to help our beautiful apple orchards survive.

Here are some ways you can help now:

- Attend the <u>Sonoma County Supervisor's meeting</u> on Tuesday, Feb. 27th. Be there by 10 am; questions will be taken around 1:30. We will gather at <u>Canavari's Delicatessen</u> during lunch break.
- Write, call, or email your Country Supervisor to request they do what they can to support our orchards by supporting a local processing facility
- Stay informed about this issue and talk to your friends and neighbors about it
- Let us know if you have an interest in helping our community develop a new plant or buy Manzana's plant, perhaps form a co-op, your ideas are welcome
- If you have an orchard, large or small, know that a group of interested people and organizations are working hard to be sure our apples get processed and our orchards survive
